# Voice of the Villages

For many, Michael Eavis is best known as the founder of the world-famous Glastonbury Festival. But for those in Pilton village we know Michael not just for the music and the crowds but for the work on his farm and his involvement in the local community.

Worthy Farm, Michael's dairy farm, is a thriving example of how tradition and technology can work hand in hand. With 550 milking cows and 600 calves, the farm uses a robotic rotary milking parlour—one of only a few in the UK. This allows the 500 Holstein cows to be milked under the expert management of John and Pam Taylor and a dedicated team of 10, producing Worthy Farm cheese that is sold across the UK as well as being on the shelves of the local Co-Op in Pilton. Sustainability is also a key part of Worthy Farm with biogas generated from slurry being used to power parts of the operation. For Michael it's a big deal that the farm was a 2023 finalist for the NMR/RABDF Gold Cupwhich is the UK's premier dairy herds competition - having already won the award back in 2014.

Michael's journey to farming was unexpected. At 16, inspired by a photograph of his uncle in the Australian Navy, he joined the Merchant Navy. Michael tells how the picture of a handsome man in uniform played a key role in his joining up. He trained on the River Thames on the Worchester, later joining the Union Castle Shipping Company, before being called home at 19 when his father fell ill. Taking over 100 acres single-handedly, Michael couldn't afford staff, finding a job for the one worker in the village, whilst Michael took on every aspect of farm life - from milking to calving - himself. Today, the farm spans over 300 acres.

Michael has long believed that farming should serve the community. His passion led to the donation of land for affordable housing in Pilton—52 homes that now make up Maggie's Farm, officially opened by Prince Charles in 2010. Instigating the installation of the CoOp in the village and at the festival, led not only to a great food offering, but also provision of a local Post Office. He was also behind the rescue of the historic Pilton Tithe Barn, destroyed by fire in 1963, lovingly restored with help from English Heritage, the builders of the Globe Theatre in London, and support from the Festival.

Michael Eavis may have built one of the world's greatest festivals and has been awarded a Knighthood, a recognition championed by the people of the village, for his services to music and charity. For the people of Pilton, he's best known as the farmer who has given much to support the community and village he lives in.

We're proud to say we've not only retained our loyal user groups but also welcomed new ones, including local skittle teams and even the Church. From reintroducing food on Friday nights to serving pies and pasties Thursday through Sunday, and yes, Sunday Lunch is making a much-anticipated return very soon!

# The Pilton Community Food Fridge

The village has a team of volunteers working to reduce food waste through the redistribution of food that would normally be thrown out, via the community fridge and freezer. These are located in a small shed at the top of Barrow Lane, bear to the entrance to the Methodist Church.

Opening hours vary depending on the level of food, time of year and volunteer opening or closing; however, it is typically open by 9am until dark or the food runs out. Anyone is welcome to take any produce that they would like, but we politely ask that users only take of any high value items such as meat or fish. ## Sound what?

Sound bar? Sound bath? Cue glazed eyes, raised eyebrows and pursed lips masking thoughts of 'uh oh this one's gone full hippy!' Often the response I get when talking to people in the area about my new line of work - sound therapy. Despite growing appeal, mainly due to the restorative effects on the mind and body, many people are unfamiliar with and have not experienced sound baths.

Sound baths are sessions where attendees are simply bathed in sound. Different instruments are used - most commonly 'crystal singing bowls' (big glass bowls attuned to each different note), as well as Gongs, Tibetan singing bowls, ocean wave drums, crystal pyramids and many others. In my sessions I focus on creating a calm atmosphere, starting with gentle movement and guided breathing to clear the mind, before I play my crystal bowls and Gong.

Sound baths offer numerous benefits for physical and mental health, promoting physiological responses like reduced blood pressure, lower heart rates and pain relief by activation of the parasympathetic nervous system. This triggers the release of serotonin, melatonin and endorphins, leaving participants feeling fabulous! During a sound bath, the brain enters a Theta state, where it becomes deeply relaxed yet still aware, similar to the edge of sleep, around 4-7 pulsations per second. In this state healing is most effective. The science behind sound healing is rooted in vibrations. Everything, including our bodies, operates at a frequency, and various experiences can cause these frequencies to become misaligned, potentially leading to illness. The sound waves from the instruments help realign the body's frequencies, restoring balance and promoting health, much like tuning an instrument after it's been disturbed.

I've been offering sound baths for a year now, running "Rest & Reignite," in local areas like Pilton, Pylle, and Middlewick. I'm passionate about bringing sound baths to a wider audience, including men and older individuals, and I would love to offer special sessions for these groups. I'm considering a menonly session or an earlier time slot for those who prefer to go to bed earlier, but I need a minimum of 10 people for these to be viable.

Sessions last around 90 minutes and cost £20, or £15 for those on a low income. I can also offer work-for-space options for those facing financial difficulty. If you're interested in giving it a try, please contact me, and I will organize these special sessions if there's enough interest. # **Obituary: Some Recollections of Ruth Eavis 1938-2025**

News of Ruth's passing hit Pilton like a sledge hammer – she was a rock to so many, a very special person. Gill Eavis wrote, "Ruth was my sister-in-law but also an exceptionally good friend who I thought the world of. Her lovely cottage was always open with the radio on - even if she wasn't around. She was a friend to everyone, a truly wonderful person - I miss her so much."

As do the hundreds of people who attended her funeral just before Easter. Daughter of a Methodist Minister and devout follower of Methodism, as well as Chapel organist every Sunday, Ruth's faith was central to everything, as was her love of flowers, birds, children, landscape, music. Family meant everything to her. Her three daughters and six grandchildren and her sister Margaret's children celebrated all these elements in a beautiful thanksgiving, led by Rev. Tina Swire. At the tea afterwards, tables had embroidered cloths and flower-filled jugs from Hazelmount — a typical Ruth touch, as she would leave posies of flowers on doorsteps for bereavements or birthdays.

"60 years ago, Ruth was the first person to welcome us to Pilton," wrote Daphne Cannnock. "Her joyful personality, so abundantly evident, encouraged many subsequent newcomers. Her enthusiasm for village projects and activities inspired and made people pleased to be involved. Her willingness to play piano anywhere as well as organ duties at the Chapel was so encouraging. We all loved Ruth and we all miss her."

A colleague from West Pennard School days, Cathy Drinkwater, wrote "Ruth's warmth and kindness were relished by the countless children in her care. For 25 years she helped to nurture both them and the new teachers, making all feel welcome and cherished."

John Fletcher wrote a play for her 70<sup>th</sup> birthday, available on www.piltonhistorygroup.org from which brief excerpts follow: "What word actually defines Ruth? ...in the end the only word is 'good'....she is a prodigious doer ...she never stops doing things. Good things. Practical things which actually help people....." Describing the house as a grotto that children loved "It is extremely significant that the objects Ruth collected above all else were images of hens on eggcups, tea cups, tea pots etc...if anyone was ever a mother hen with her chicks, that person was Ruth." When the girls were teenage, she also collected teenagers who "congregated around the kitchen

table...talking started. Revelation, ideas, ideals." *Older people also* "came with problems, who were never turned away....from somewhere she always managed to find the strength to listen fully...and offer sensible non-judgmental advice." *In a recent update John wrote how she had added to her* "quiver of good deeds" *by visiting* "innumerable house-bound persons."

Hilary Austin wrote "For over 30 years Ruth held a coffee evening at Hazelmount in support of Christian Aid. Like everything Ruth did, it was always a joyous occasion, with people supporting the event because of Ruth. Everyone crowded into her kitchen and sitting room: it was always a huge success. Ruth will be very much missed but would definitely want fund raising to continue for those in poverty worldwide."

Peter Lawrence wrote "You don't choose your neighbours but with Ruth we were exceptionally lucky. We just think of her as beautiful in every way. Her face shone with love and friendship. She was a people person. Her legendary collection of bric-a-brac around house and garden was admired by all and her succession of cars, parked at interesting angles outside Hazelmount, gathering dents and scratches, were village features! She lives on in our hearts."

Candace wrote "Ruth was practically the first person I met in the 70s when I came to Pilton, with her three adorable young girls and I loved them all. Their warmth and welcoming manner was so memorable. You never wanted to leave Ruth's home, though one did wonder how she cooked, as every surface seemed covered in interesting objects. Ruth was unforget-table and will be remembered by us all. She was the heart of Pilton."

Jenny concludes: For decades, Ruth and I worked together on Pilton Show's Emporium –she narrowly missed gateposts whenever she delivered here! She supported the Show for over 50 years. She was a cornerstone of many aspects of village life, much loved, missed and irreplaceable.

# Obituary: Abbi Mnatzaganian 1939-2025

The Lord's Prayer in Armenian, spoken by Father Bagdassarian, imported especially from London, was just one unusual feature in an emotional farewell for a special man, Abbi, whose talented creative family and friends recited poems they had written or played music newly composed in a full Pilton Church. The service was mainly conducted by Rev. Kalantha Brewis from the Worcester Diocese, a friend of the family and recently appointed Honorary Chaplain to the King. A fitting send off honouring a gentle and cultured man of many parts, who spoke four languages and always wanted to teach.

Abbi and Maddy moved to Somerset in 1983 when he joined the modern languages department at Millfield.

Maddy said "he loved Pilton, it reminded him of France. He found the Gable House for us and made it a haven for friends, family and students." Former student Patrick Forbes, from 'the class of 95' and now working in the Middle East, found his Arabic teaching invaluable and in gratitude he wrote:

The truest measure of a teacher's legacy is not found in accolades or rank, but in the quiet acknowledgments of students who say: *my life changed because of them*. Abbi left that kind of mark—deep, personal, enduring—on countless young people who passed through his classroom.

Though best known for his Arabic classes, Abbi also taught French to dozens of students each year. In doing so, he did far more than teach vocabulary or grammar—he invited them to dream in another language, to see the world through different eyes, to fall in love with culture itself.

He rarely relied on textbooks. Instead, he brought stories—drawn from his rich imagination and told with the craft of a true Jerusalem *hakawati* (storyteller). With poise and wit, he would begin a tale, paint it with emotion and detail, and then, just at the climax, pause—leaving the ending for his students to discover, or to create, on their own. It was teaching as storytelling. And it was unforgettable.

Beyond the classroom Abbi was clearly very dedicated to family life and in love with Maddy. He will be sorely missed, but not forgotten.

Peter Lawrence also worked in the UAE and Jordan: "Getting to know Abbi and Maddy through History Group and other village activities was a special treat. As we have lived in the Arab world including Jordan and I have often visited the occupied territories and Gaza, we found much to talk about and share. He contributed to my Alcantara (bridge) project with a piece describing his history and gratitude to Jordan. He was a Palestinian Armenian, born in Jerusalem, his parents being Armenian refugees. He experienced directly the Arab-Zionist hostilities and, as a child, he and his brother were injured by shrapnel.

Abbi introduced me to the poem entitled *Groong*, the Armenian word for the crane. it tells of cranes flying each year from Armenia to Jerusalem and back, bringing and taking messages. As he translated the poem to me, tears filled his eyes. It was a huge privilege to get to know Abbi. He continued to teach Arabic to British military personnel until very recently and he was admired and appreciated by all who knew him."

Candace, with Palestinian family, wrote: Abbi and I had a special connection. My grandfather was Palestinian and Abbi was born in Jerusalem and both our families had to forcibly leave. What a joy, for me, that in a small village, I should find a fellow Palestinian. We would hold hands, speak of food, cry about Jerusalem and the atrocities on our Palestinian brothers...I shall deeply miss him...."

# **Obituary Mildred Sands**

Mildred loved being part of The Happy Circle Club which is held in The Club and has just celebrated its 46th Birthday. The Happy Circle Club was opened by the late Winnie Boyce back in 1979 and met in the Pilton Working Mens Club every other week.

Speakers were getting expensive so it was suggested by The President, Freda Boyce, and agreed by the Committee to meet monthly in 2024. Freda, being the Daughter in Law of the late Winnie Boyce, joined the Happy Circle in 2013, becoming The President in 2019.

Mildred was a Committee Member and became the Tea Lady being responsible in the Kitchen. Mildred did this for 13 years making the sandwiches in her own home for up to 44 Member's, she used good ingredients for the fillings, Tinned Salmon, Cheese, Egg, Corn beef and if she did Cucumber, skin would be removed sprinkled with a little vinegar and using her special slicer. Nothing was too much trouble and all the Members appreciated the Tea Time Breaks.

Mildred enjoyed her turn playing skittles but loved nothing better than the Happy Circle Day Trips on South West Coaches with her late Husband Eric at her side until his passing in 2009. The Coach being driven by Bill Lear. Mildred and Eric met Bill when he drove the service bus that came through Pilton on a Friday morning picking up passengers to go to Yeovil for a morning shopping until Bill retired in 2015. Bill remained a friend of Mildred and he would often ring her to have a chat.

After Eric's passing she still enjoyed going on the trips with her two close friends Teresa and Mary and being taken to Happy Circle by Fred and Libby and meeting everyone.

# **Glastonbury Festival**



Dear Resident,

Below are items of further information regarding the Glastonbury Festival arrangements for residents of the Pilton area:

**Vehicle Passes** – Village Vehicle Passes and your tickets will be available from Pilton Village Hall on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> June between 1pm and 6pm and again on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> June between 6pm & 8pm. As you will now be aware Pilton Village access passes and the Green Car Park Passes had to be pre ordered online. No additional passes for Pilton access or Green Car Park will be available at these sessions.

**Shuttle Bus** — New for this year a FREE shuttle bus will be running in the village. It will be running on a circular route with stops at Oathills, the Methodist Chapel, Village Hall and Mount Pleasant (Sutley House) From the stop at Sutley house a signed and lit rout will take you along the footpath to Pylle Road where access to the site can be gained through Mary's gate. The bus will run continuously from 1000 to 0200 on Wednesday to Sunday. The bus will save residents having to walk on the narrow roads through the village. Full details and a map can be obtained from us at the passes sessions or by email.

**Cockmill Lane** – Again this year, to improve safety for Cockmill Lane residents and pedestrians, a Temporary One-way Order will be in place in Cockmill Lane from Orchard Gate to Pylle Road (north bound). There will be no through traffic from the direction of Pylle Road (Pilton).

**Security** – Security levels will be the same as last festival.

**Checkpoints** – The checkpoints will also be in the same locations as the last festival and will be operational from Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> June to Monday 30<sup>th</sup> June. Full details of checkpoints, road closures and one-way systems will be available at the Vehicle Passes Distribution sessions.

**Hot Line Number – 01749 899631** — is again operational all year, this number will put you straight through to the festival office on site, during office hours, and they will be able to deal with any urgent ongoing problems. This will be manned 24 hrs a day during the actual festival period. It is manned by dedicated staff in the Event Control Centre so they will have good access to all the relevant bodies and this will give you a better service.

**Drop-in Centre** – There will still be a member of GFL security based at Pilton Village Hall between 0800 & 2000 (25<sup>th</sup> -30<sup>th</sup> June) who will have a direct link to the hotline team in the Event Control Centre.

# Tessa Munt MP's update for Pilton, Croscombe, North Wootton and the surrounding hamlets



Hello everyone!

It's been another busy month! In Parliament, I supported my colleague Richard Foord MP in introducing his Bill to ensure MPs have a vote on the content of any UK / US trade deal *before* it takes effect, which is crucial to protect our farmers and their industry.

We've called lively House of Commons debates on crumbling hospitals and the sewage scandal, and we'll continue to press the Government to enact the bolder common-sense solutions we've offered.

I asked the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero how we can improve energy efficiency for older homes and those in conservation areas, especially in relation to permitting double and triple-glazed windows, an issue affecting many residents here. Answering, Ed Milliband said he is "constantly on the look-out for small measures and large in the planning system that can obstruct sensible energy efficient measures ... that will make all the difference." So, I've made several suggestions which might improve our planning legislation.

In a demonstration of how changes *can* be made from the backbenches and not just from within Government, an announcement that solar panels are to be fitted on all new-build homes in England by 2027 confirmed that the common sense driving my colleague Max Wilkinson MP's 'Sunshine Bill' has made it on to the statute books. A big win!

Also on our environment and ensuring the UK prioritises investment in the circular economy, I introduced a debate on recycling our 600,000 tonnes of UK end-of-life tyre waste each year. 350,000 tonnes are sent to India and burned illegally, endangering residents, workers and polluting the environment. My questions to the Minister focused on loopholes in licensing, the lack of enforcement of regulations here, and making small legislative changes so tyres are disposed of safely and responsibly, and processed here to create new jobs and businesses, benefitting both the environment *and* the economy. I'll continue to press for this.

In the Justice Committee, I took part in an evidence session with the leadership of the Criminal Cases Review Commission, which investigates potential

miscarriages of justice and refers cases to the Court of Appeal if convictions appear unsafe. This meeting was illuminating – as are many of our sessions. You can view them all on the parliamentlive.tv website if you are interested. As your MP, it is my privilege to listen to residents, hear what concerns them and campaign for change where it's needed. # **Croscombe Flood Group May 2025**

Although the weather has been very kind to us so far this year, the Flood Group is very conscious that sudden downpours can create localised flooding. To that end the Flood Wardens met for a successful 'dry run' of the procedures to be followed in a flood event.

We are also pleased to say that the detritus and debris partially blocking the culvert where it splits in two has been cleared and we are just finalising a grant application for an access chamber near the bifurcation that will make it much easier to clear in the future. The recent survey of the culvert path will help us identify the precise location.

This summer we aim to complete a survey of the river banks in Croscombe and where possible work with riparian owners to identify any areas that need attention to prevent any collapses of banks or could be a source of material that could get caught in the culvert.

We also opened our free breakfast club. We applied to be one of the 750 pilot schools nationally to test and learn until March 2026. Parents can drop off for supervision only from 7:30, as they always have, but from 8:00 - 8:30 the provision is free to all, with a breakfast included and no booking necessary - to allow for parents / carers to get to work or get on with their day. It is working wonderfully well for us! We have between 50 and 60 attending each day and provides a great start to the school day for the children that are accessing it, as well and we hope their parents / carers. The children have their breakfast and can choose to remain inside for activities, or go outside with another member of staff for a more active start to the day.

Mrs Catley and her husband were busy over the Easter holidays revamping the Library. With the help of the PTA and other staff, they purchased and installed a number of new bookshelves to give the Library a fresh new look. The children took part in a competition to create book-inspired images on the windows with glass pens. The space looks fantastic! Thank you to everyone that worked so hard to make it such an inviting place.

Our Summer topics got underway in each of our 7 classes. The children's learning will be complemented this term with trips to the Lifeskills Centre in Bristol, Mill on the Brue, Okehampton Adventure Centre, Carymoor, The Newt and the County Ground, Taunton...along with numerous visitors and in-house learning opportunities. We certainly hope that the weather remains for the foreseeable as our Year 6s go and experience a range of outdoor and adventurous activities at Okehampton, post SATs, staying for 4 nights (5 days). To ready our Year 6s for such a big adventure, we do a day visit to Mill on the Brue in Year 4, and the Year 5s stay at Kilve for 2 nights (3 days).
