

I suspect that a perfect Christmas is not the reality for everyone. For many it is just a month of pressure leading up to the big day, as we try to recapture the excitement that we felt many years ago.

I wonder what helps you find that feeling of excitement. Is it the sound of familiar carols, the smell of pine needles or turkey roasting? Maybe it's friends and family getting together or looking at children as they can hardly contain themselves? Maybe excitement is something you only experience at other times of the year as Christmas fills you with dread.

Whatever Christmas is for you, I hope you will be able to join us at one of the many Christmas services we hold around the Benefice, to take time out to capture the excitement of that first Christmas and to be reminded of the life changing presence of Emmanuel 'God with us'. POPPY APPEAL 2022 – CROSCOMBE, DINDER AND DULCOTE



GABRIEL'S ORCHARD


Local fresh apple juice...

STREETLINK – Helping the Homeless

I am sure many of you feel slightly helpless when you see homeless people in our villages. It is difficult to know what to do for the best. I have discovered there is an online reporting system called Streetlink which has been set up to make sure homeless people can get the help they need. You can find them at <https://www.streetlink.org.uk> Once you register with them you can let them know the location and rough description of the person. They then send to the correct, independent local homelessness outreach team, so that they can locate the individual and connect them to support services.

Having used them recently I am impressed with the system and the response of the Mendip outreach team.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP OF BATH AND WELLS

His light is never extinguished

As 2022 comes to a close, our hearts go out to the people of Ukraine whose country was invaded by Russia on 24th February this year. In the months since, we have watched in horror as civilians, cities and infrastructure have been attacked, land occupied and atrocities committed.

The UK has received more than 100,000 people fleeing from the conflict. The gift of their presence among us reminds us that this is no “quarrel in a far away country, between people of whom we know nothing”.

As we recall once again the coming into the world of Jesus at Christmas, our challenge is to connect our celebration of his birth with the realities and consequences of the conflict that is happening. Sadly, it’s not hard to see the links. Jesus was born in a land (Palestine) that had been annexed by an expansionist foreign power (Rome) in pursuit of its territorial ambitions. The demands of the Roman occupiers meant that Jesus’ birth happened not at home in Nazareth, but at a counting centre - Bethlehem. He was born in a stable because ‘there was no room at the inn’. While still a baby, Jesus became a refugee when taken to Egypt due to warnings of atrocities to come.

Viewed this way, the Christmas story is no sentimental fable. It is a brutal foreshadowing of the events that Ukraine and our whole world have encountered this year. At the same time, it is also a story of hope. For it tells us that even in the very worst that can happen the Christ child whose birth we celebrate knows all too well the realities of the human condition. As a result, in any darkness his light is never extinguished. For he is Emmanuel – God with us.

So as we come to the end of 2022 we give thanks that God is always with us in whatever we face. May he be with Ukraine. May he be with Russia. And may he be welcomed by us all.
